

Ganglion Cyst


Information for Patients

Background

Your GP has referred you to the Hand Unit at St John's Hospital because of the swelling around your wrist. From your GP's description it is likely that you have a ganglion cyst.

What is a ganglion cyst?

A ganglion is a smooth lump under the skin due to a cyst which contains a thick, jelly-like fluid and can vary in size. It may look something like the pictures below.







Treatment

Wrist ganglion cysts are harmless and can be safely left alone. Nearly all eventually disappear and usually cause little trouble. There are no long term problems from not treating the ganglion. Although we can remove the fluid with a needle and syringe, it comes back again in up to 80% of (8 out of 10) cases within weeks or months.

We do not routinely recommend surgery for a simple ganglion in the NHS across Scotland as:

- Surgery results in a permanent scar
- The ganglion may come back after surgery
- Occasionally surgery can cause nerve damage, stiffness and chronic pain may occur.

Therefore, we do not routinely provide a hospital appointment for people with wrist ganglions.
