


# How to encourage early language and communication with your child

Information for Parents





## **Listening and Attention**

It is important for your child to develop listening and attention skills to understand and learn to talk

- ◆ Be face-to-face when you are talking to your child
- ◆ Say your child's name and get their eye contact before talking
- Reduce background noise e.g. turn off the television
- Use an animated voice and facial expressions to get and maintain your child's attention
- ◆ Talk about what you hear, e.g. "splish splash" (in the bath), "broom broom" (in the car)



#### **Turn Taking**

Turn taking is important as it is the basis of a two-way interaction. We naturally take turns in conversations

- ◆ Play simple turn taking games with your child
- ◆ Incorporate turn taking into everyday activities and routines
- ◆ Ideas for turn taking: try building a tower, rolling a ball back and forth, blowing bubbles, tidying up toys
- ◆ During turn taking games, why not try saying "your turn", "my turn"



#### **Play**

Play is vital to how children develop language and discover the world around them

- Spend time every day playing with your child
- ◆ Let your child choose how to play with the toys
- Follow your child's lead watch to see what your child is interested in and join in
- ◆ Comment on what your child is doing during play, e.g. "teddy's sleeping!"
- Name objects and toys your child is interested in




#### **Developing Language**

Children need to hear language and be given opportunities to learn and try new words

- ◆ Always name things around you. Keep language short and clear to allow opportunities for imitation. Praise any attempts – clear or not
- ◆ Use pointing and gestures to aid understanding, e.g. holding your hands palms up for "all gone"
- ◆ Offer choices wherever possible, e.g. snack "milk or juice?"
- ◆ Model and expand language, e.g. child: "dog", adult: "big dog"
- ◆ Encourage imitation with toys. Give your child time to copy
- Repeat new words over and over again so your child can begin to understand and use them
