



Tilt test

Information for patients

What is a tilt test?

A tilt test is when your blood pressure and heart rate is measured, firstly with you lying down, and then at five minute intervals whilst you are supported in an upright position. This test is designed to assess symptoms you may have been experiencing, like light-headedness or dizziness, and to see if your symptoms are related to your blood pressure or heart rate.

How long will it last for?

The test will usually be for about an hour.

Important instructions

Unless you are diabetic please fast for two hours before the test. Continue taking any medications as usual. If in any doubt, always check with your consultant.

Patient Transport
