






How to use condoms and where to get them




This booklet will teach you about how to use condoms and how you can get them.



In the booklet there are drawings of:


- private body parts

There are no photos of real people's private body parts in this booklet.



It is ok to see these drawings because you are learning about condoms.





Why do people use condoms?



Penis in vagina sex can make a woman, or a person with a uterus, pregnant.

Being pregnant means having a baby grow in the uterus.




People use condoms to prevent pregnancy.
This means not getting pregnant or having a baby.




There are infections you can get from having sex called STIs.

STI is short way of saying sexually transmitted infection.


Why do people use condoms?



People use condoms to prevent STIs.




Using condoms and dams is a good way of looking after you and your partner's sexual health.



What are condoms?




Condoms that go over the penis are usually called condoms, they can also be called external condoms.



A condom is a thin, stretchy tube.

They are very soft and flexible (they move very easily).




Condoms come in different sizes.

Use the size that fits your penis best.


Condoms that fit well feel better and are safer.

What are condoms?



Some condoms are smooth, and some have lines or dots that feel different on our bodies.

You can choose to use the type of condom that feels good for you.




Condoms come in different colours.

Some are different flavours and can smell different.




Most condoms are made of something called latex.

Some people are allergic to latex and will have to use special condoms with no latex.




A condom has to be put on the penis before sex happens.

Put a condom on before the penis touches the mouth, vulva, vagina, or anus.




Check the use by date
Condoms have use by dates,
like food and drinks.
Check the use by date on the
condom packet.

Never use a condom that is past its use by date.




Only put a condom on when the penis is erect.

Erect means when the penis is hard.




Take the condom out of the wrapper.

Use your fingers to tear the wrapper open.




Never use your teeth, scissors or anything sharp to open the condom wrapper.
This might tear the condom.




Get the condom the right way up.

If is is the wrong way up you will not be able to put it on properly.




Squeeze the tip of the condom between your thumb and finger.

This stops air getting stuck in the condom and leaves space for semen to come out of the penis. This is called ejaculation.



Hold the condom over the tip of the penis.

Roll the condom down to the bottom of the penis.



If the condom does not roll down the penis it might be on the wrong way round.

Get a new condom and try again.




Lube, or lubricant, is a slippy fluid that can make sex feel better.

You can put lube on the outside of a condom after you put it on.




Use water based lubricant with condoms.

Never use oil lubricants, like Vaseline or baby oil. These can make the condom break.



Keep the condom on until you finish having sex.

This might be when the penis has ejaculated (when semen comes out of the penis).
Or it might be when someone decides they want to stop.



If the condom falls off during sex, put a new one on.


Never put a used condom back on.




If the condom breaks or tears stop having sex.

Take the broken condom off and throw it away.


If you want to keep having sex, put on a new condom.




Take the condom off after ejaculation or when sex has finished.



To take the condom off, hold the bottom of the condom and slide the penis out of the condom.




Wrap the condom in a tissue or toilet paper and put it in the bin.

If you are aged 13 years and older, and live in Lothian you can get free condoms from the following places.



If you need condoms you can ask:

- a nurse
- your support worker
- a doctor


They can help you get free condoms.




C:card points are places in the community that give out free condoms.

You can get free condoms from your GP (doctor).



You can buy condoms from any supermarket or pharmacy.

How to get condoms




If you have any questions or worries you can speak to a trusted adult. This could be:

- a nurse




Your decision to use contraception or condoms is confidential.
